Officer Reports

Prospector (Membership, Michael McCaffrey): Membership is up to 317, of which 92 are new members and 32 are honorary members. We are delighted to note that not only is the total number at this time above last year's, but it is also greater than that of 2 years ago.

Sunbeam (Sunbeam, Peg Cook) Dave Minott read report for Peg Cook

- Linda Schermer was kind enough to pass along the news that her friend and long-time Westerner, Marilyn Thaden Dexter, has passed away at age 86. Marilyn became an active hiker, mountain climber, and skier after moving to Seattle, Washington in 1971. She shared her active outdoor life with her husband, David Dexter, after the two were married in 1983. After David's death in 1998, Marilyn moved to Sedona, where she became very active in the Sedona Westerners from 1999 to 2017. Ranger (Forest Service liaison, Michael Henry) Dave Minott read report for Michael Henry

- Since we last met in September, Michael conveys that Westerners hikers have made two reports of graffiti to the Ranger. One of those reports was, unfortunately, another incident attributed to a long-sought after serial tagger. Michael Henry wants to give a special shout-out to Amanda Maxwell and Ray LaPorte for their recognition of this incident as a high-priority graffiti tag, their instant response in reporting the tag, and then their extra effort extended in guiding the graffiti clean-up team to the location of the tag. And to wrap up this report, Michael makes his usual reminder that photos and GPS coordinates furnished by Westerners hikers are of vital importance when reporting instances of graffiti, transient camping, and excessive trash. Resources are limited for researching and remediating these situations, and, with the available technology almost everyone has these days, pictures and GPS coordinates save time and effort.

Cliff Walker (Cultural Resources etiquette, Gary Morgan): reported on his efforts at trying to get All Trails do something about our sensitive areas (for example, Keyhole/Subway). A representative from All Trails told him that they could not remove the track information about the Keyhole/Subway, but that they could and did add a phrase to alert hikers to be aware and cautious of the sensitive ruins. Interestingly enough, Gary reported that he had double-checked on the status of said phrase this morning and he found that this track has been removed entirely from the All Trails site. The Cliff Walker will be accepting input for any other sensitive tracks that we want have phrases to alert potential hikers of respecting the sensitive sites. Guest Speaker

2021 is the 60th anniversary of the Sedona Westerners, our Diamond Anniversary.

Our Trail Boss, Dave Minott presented the highlights of our history since our founding in 1961. Among the highlights were:

- Founded in 1961 as a Western-themed social club and civic organization
- Hiking began in 1965, with one hike per week
- By 2000, there were 5 hiking groups
- By late 1961 there were 39 members, including members and/or descendants of 3 of Sedona's founding families (Schnebly, Thompson, and Purtyman)
- Sponsored "Western Days" (1967 – 1972), a weekend event that included dressing in Western clothing, riding horses, providing Western-style entertainment to tourists (square dances, hay rides, rodeos, bullfights, parades, burro races, and barbecues)
- The publication "Those Early Days" (1968), written by Westerners Allen Bristow and Myrtle Smith, contained historical content based primarily on the recorded recollections of over 50 Sedona-area pioneers
- The Sedona Westerners were instrumental in standardizing names for many of the formations in our area
- The Sedona Westerners were early leaders in trail marking in Sedona
- The Sedona Westerners were early leaders in producing Sedona Trail Maps
- Were focused on conservation and stewardship from the beginning
- Bob Fuege wrote an account of the Sedona Westerner history for the 40th anniversary, which is available on our website.
